

Regulatory Performance Committee Annual Report 2022/23

Introduction from the Chair

The Regulatory Performance Committee (the Committee) provides an important forum for Ahpra to work in partnership with National Boards to support development of new ways of working and improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our regulatory work.

Throughout the year the Committee considered quarterly regulatory performance reports as well as several quality assurance reports of regulatory functions. These quality reviews provided a comprehensive overview and analysis of compliance with approved policy and process and specific aspects of our regulatory performance.

The Committee is pleased that one year on from the changes implemented following *Operation Reset*, coupled with the continued calibration of work implementing the risk assessment framework, there is continued improvement in regulatory performance. The Committee also heard how the important work of the Expert Advisory Group on practitioner stress and distress has and will continue to inform how we manage notifications in the future.

In preparation for the first release of the Transformation Program, members regularly received and discussed updates on likely impacts the release would have on regulatory performance. Although a system 'go-live' date is yet to be confirmed, the Committee notes the expected significant benefits to be realised from the implementation and that this will be a key focus of the Committee in 2023/24.

The Committee has been actively engaged with monitoring regulatory performance within the cosmetic surgery space including implementation of recommendations of the *Independent review of the regulation of medical practitioners who perform cosmetic surgery*. In 2023/24, while the Committee will still monitor this work, it will also expand its focus on the developing activities on strengthening regulation in the non-surgical cosmetic procedure sector.

Finally, in December 2022, following the Committee's endorsement, the Ahpra Board agreed to amend the Committee's charter to include an independent/external member with significant understanding of regulatory systems, subsequently appointing Mr Andrew Brown, former Queensland Health Ombudsman to the position. In addition, Ms Richelle McCausland, National Health Practitioner Ombudsman and Privacy Commissioner is now a regular observer at Committee meetings and brings a strengthened connection between Ahpra's regulatory performance and the work of her office.

Thank you to Committee members and Ahpra staff for their contribution to the important work of the Committee.

Ahpra and the National Boards regulate these registered health professions: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health practice, Chinese medicine, chiropractic, dental, medical, medical radiation practice, midwifery, nursing, occupational therapy, optometry, osteopathy, paramedicine, pharmacy, physiotherapy, podiatry and psychology.

Role of the Committee

The Regulatory Performance Committee is a committee of the Ahpra Board. The Committee has been established to provide advice and oversight in the following areas:

- strategic regulatory operational policy informed by Ahpra and the National Boards
- risk settings and management, including mitigation strategies and triggers for action and escalation
- regulatory performance and strategies to address policy and performance issues
- regulatory performance reporting to National Boards and external stakeholders.

Functions and responsibilities of the Committee

The Committee's functions are to:

- oversee Ahpra's management of regulatory performance, including registration, notifications and compliance matters
- provide advice on regulatory performance measures and Key Performance Indicators on timeliness, cost and quality
- review Ahpra's quarterly performance reports for registration, notifications and compliance and provide advice to the Board and National Boards on regulatory performance
- provide a forum for discussion, review and advice on significant issues of regulatory operational policy.

Powers of the Committee

The Committee has no formal delegated power from the Board. The Committee functions in an oversight and review role and makes recommendations to the Board.

Membership

Membership is appointed by the Board and consists of:

- up to four members of the Board
- at least five chairs of National Boards (including the high-volume Boards and one lower volume Board),
- a community member of a National Board
- an independent member

The Committee may also invite the National Health Practitioner Ombudsman to attend meetings.

In addition, meetings were attended by:

Committee activities for reporting period 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023

Matters of note considered by the Committee included:

- Notifications involving cosmetic surgery and work of the Cosmetic Surgery Enforcement Unit
- Tribunal delays associated with COVID backlogs and budgetary limitations
- Continued monitoring of outcomes following Operation Reset
- Impacts of the Transformation Program on regulatory performance
- Findings of the Expert Advisory Group on practitioner distress
- Establishment of enhanced support for applicants identifying as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

Regulatory performance

- Regular scrutiny of quarterly regulatory performance reports
- Provided feedback on the revised quarterly performance report
- Considered periodic quality assurance reviews of regulatory functions.

Notifications

- Monitoring outcomes of the Notifications strategy and development of four notifications streams
- Regular reviewing of the notifier and practitioner engagement dashboards
- Monitoring the action plan to deal with aged notifications

Administrative complaints

Regularly reviewed and scrutinised the administrative complaints dashboard and agreed an annual report on complaints with insights and analysis be provided to the Board.

- Received presentations on the Risk assessment and control framework and next steps
- Reviewed the Committee charter.
- Agreed to an effectiveness survey of the Committee
