# Who we are

The Ahpra Board established the independently chaired Accreditation Committee (the committee) consistent with <u>Ministerial Council Policy Direction 2020-1 – Independent Accreditation Committee</u> issued to the National Boards and Ahpra on 4 February 2021.

The committee is chaired by Professor Andrew Wilson. Consistent with Ministers' policy direction, Professor Wilson is an independent chair (external to the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (the National Scheme)).

# What we do

The committee provides independent and expert advice on accreditation reform and other National Scheme accreditation matters to National Boards, accreditation authorities and Ahpra. The committee's priority areas of work reflect the issues that Australia's Health Ministers referred to it. Supporting good practice in professional capabilities is one of those priorities.

Accreditation is a key part of the National Scheme. It helps ensure that individuals seeking registration to work in the health workforce have the knowledge, skills and professional attributes to safely and competently practise their profession in Australia. Accreditation functions in the National Scheme include developing accreditation standards and accrediting programs of study that lead to registration.

# Why we consult

The committee undertakes wide ranging consultation on accreditation reform issues. Your feedback helps the committee get important information from different groups, including accreditation authorities, professional associations, and education providers as well as members of the public and registered health practitioners. This feedback helps the committee understand people's views, concerns and expectations.

# What is this draft guidance about?

# This guidance is about the knowledge and skills registered health practitioners need to practise in their profession.

Every profession regulated by the National Scheme has a document outlining the knowledge, skills and professional attributes required to practice as a registered health practitioner in that profession in Australia. Some professions call these professional capabilities, while others call them professional competencies, graduate outcomes or standards for practice. However they are named, their purpose is to describe the knowledge, skills and professional attributes needed to safely and competently practise as a registered health practitioner in Australia.

The purpose of this draft guidance on developing professional capabilities is to foster good practice and enhance efficiency and consistency in the development of new or revised professional capabilities across health professions regulated under the National Scheme.

The draft guidance outlines draft processes for the development of professional capabilities, consistent with Ahpra's <u>Procedures for the development of accreditation standards.</u> It also discusses important issues about the governance and ownership of professional capabilities documents and the potential for Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency
